

## **GUATEMALA FORGERIES AND FAKES 1902 SCOTT 111-112**

These provisionals issued in 1902 were surcharged in red on 1895 1c revenue stamps by Tipografia Nacional in Guatemala City. This fifth provisional issue in a period of four years continued the dismal effort of the postal administration to provide adequate supplies of stamps for postal use and proved to be fertile ground for forgers.

It may help collectors to note that these stamps are plentiful and cheap, and the only time it is practical to check the authenticity of the stamps is when working with the errors which have a significant catalogue value.


The first and easiest ley to identifying forgeries is the ink color, which is red in the genuine but orange-red or rose on fakes.<sup>1</sup> The ink on the genuine surcharge was sometimes watery resulting in blurred letters, visible on the color separations here.<sup>2</sup>

Dimensions of the genuine surcharges are shown in the illustrations here.<sup>3</sup> There are other differences, one being the lack of a ball on the tip of the '2' in 1902, shown below. The genuine errors on both stamps are inverted, double plus on the 2c there is a double surcharge, one diagonal. These vary with the stamp perforation varieties (see *Guatemala I*). Scott 113 is known with faked double overprint.
